

- “Vniversæ Architectvræ Civilis Elementa” by Christian Rieger
- Published in 1756

I initially entered the title of my book "Vniversæ Architectvræ Civilis Elementa" and the author Christian Rieger in Alice's search engine to get possible related books, but I couldn't find anything. I then tried to type a part of the title of the book, "architecture universe" into the search engine and I found several results. The book is titled "Architectural Theory 1993 2009" written by Sykes Hays, 2012. The era does not match but the book nevertheless talks about various themes including the impact of digital technologies on the processes of architectural design, production, materiality and representation, etc. The author Sykes proposes several approaches and attitudes adopted by architects and architectural theorists during the mid-nineties.

I tried the topic "architecture" and "civil architecture" to get a second book that is related to mine, but unfortunately I received many inaccurate results and not inherent to Rieger's book. To get a book related to mine from the 18th century, I did a little research on the internet looking for a book from the same period. I found that in the first half of the eighteenth century the architectural style was the Baroque one. A style that arose in Italy between the end of the sixteenth and the beginning of the seventeenth century, and which then spread throughout Europe until the mid-seventeenth century. I then typed “baroque architecture” into Alice's search engine and found Leatherbarrow Eisenschmidt's “Twentieth Century Architecture” as a second option. The book is mostly about architectural development in the 20th century and how architects born in the late 19th century witnessed unprecedented modernization firsthand. An extremely new and chaotic world for architects who see industrialization lead to a disproportionate growth in the population of cities until the end of the 19th century.
